Theme of the Week – Road Safety Awareness

Road Safety Week is the UK's flagship event to promote safer road use, coordinated annually by the charity Brake and involving thousands of schools, communities and organisations across the country. Road Safety Week 2017 takes place 20th-26th November, with support from the Department for Transport and headline sponsors Aviva and BriteAngle



In the UK:

1. Speeding contributes to about a quarter of fatal road crashes on British roads.

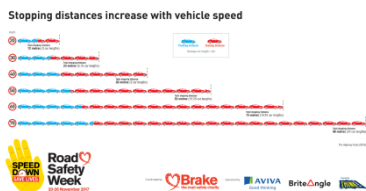
Driving is unpredictable. At higher speeds, a driver has less time to react if someone steps out in front of them. They are more likely to hit that person and will hit them harder.

2. The faster a vehicle is travelling, the harder it will hit someone. Cars travelling at higher speeds cause more severe injuries.

The relationship between speed and severity of injury is particularly critical for vulnerable road users, such as pedestrians and cyclists, as well as for children and the elderly.

3. Small increases in speed result in bigger increases in stopping distances.

Speed and stopping distances do not increase at the same rate. Small increases in speed result in bigger increases in stopping distances. At 30mph, average stopping distance is 23metres, at 20mph it is just 12metres.



If a child runs into the road three car lengths ahead of a vehicle travelling at 30mph, the driver will still be travelling at 28mph when they hit the child. At 20mph or slower the driver should have enough time to avoid hitting the child, providing they are paying attention, have well-maintained brakes, and are driving in dry conditions. See above stopping distances.

4. Young people are at particular risk of being involved in a road crash.

Road crashes are the second biggest killer of young people aged 5-19, and more than 5 children are seriously hurt or killed every single day on British roads. Most incidents involving children occur when they are walking home from school. Some children may not be able to judge the speed of approaching vehicles when they are travelling at speeds greater than 20mph, so may believe it is safe to cross when it is not.

5. Fast traffic is dangerous, frightening, noisy and polluting. It makes roads unwelcome and puts people off walking and cycling.

Speeding traffic has a negative impact on air quality, noise pollution levels and the 'liveability' of an area. Slower traffic speeds make people feel safer, which encourages more walking and cycling. More people walking and cycling means less motorised traffic on the roads and less pollution from vehicle emissions. More walking and cycling also means better health and helps prevent obesity as well as illnesses like heart disease and diabetes.
